to support them. This
means that some children must be placed in
a group home or out of
the state, far away from
their siblings and familiar
surroundings.

More foster parents are needed to give guidance and love to children who are going through a challenging time. We need more people in Buncombe County to say, "I can do that for a kid."

Being a foster parent is something you do from your heart!

Here are the facts about what it takes to be a foster parent.

MYTH: A single person can't provide care for a foster child.

MYTH: Kids in foster care have needs that I can't deal with.

MYTH: I have no control over which children I'm asked to foster.

MYTH: I will get attached to the children.

MYTH: I'm not allowed to adopt the children I foster.

FACT: A single person can provide a loving and stable home for a child. You don't have to be rich, own a home, or any certain race to be a great foster parent. You can work full time and foster! Kids in foster care need someone with an open mind and open heart.

FACT: Many children in foster care are simply children who, by no fault of their own, had to be removed from their families due to abuse or neglect. The State of North Carolina provides a stipend to cover the basic needs of a child, Medicaid covers the child's health expenses, and your licensing agency provides supportive services to foster parents such as training and respite care.

FACT: You can't choose the exact children you foster, but you can request a certain age and gender for placement in your home. The two biggest needs are 1) children and youth between the ages of 11 and 16, and 2) keeping sibling groups together. Foster parents have the final say about which placements they take.

FACT: It's true. You will get attached, and it might be painful when children leave. But many of these children have been through things no child should ever face, and they need the love and care that foster parents can provide.


FACT: While many children who enter foster care return to their birth families, there are still children who cannot return home safely. Some of these children will need a forever home.
