

# **National Bullying Prevention Month**

Youth violence refers to harmful behaviors that can start early and continue into young adulthood. The young person can be a victim, an offender, or

Youth violence includes various behaviors. Some violent acts—such as bullying, slapping, or hitting—can cause more emotional harm than physical harm.

a witness to the violence.

Others, such as robbery and assault (with or without weapons) can lead to serious injury or even death.

The ultimate goal is to stop youth violence before it starts. It is important that students feel safe to develop and learn in an environment free of critiism and bullying.

### Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS)

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is defined as the sudden death of an infant less than 1 year of age which cannot be explained after a thorough investigation is conducted, including a complete autopsy, examination of the death scene, and a review of the clinical history. About 1,500 infants died of SIDS in 2014. SIDS is the leading cause of death in infants 1 to 12 months old.

While overall rates have declined, disparities persist. African American babies are still more likely to die from SIDS as Caucasian babies. Babies ages o-6 months are at the highest risk. It is believed that better investigations of unexpected infant deaths and greater adoption of safe sleep practices have contributed to lower SIDS deaths.
